Remembering Klete Kei Ikemoto

On April 2, 2020, SEJSCC lost a selfless dad, husband, friend, mentor and community leader to COVID-19 coronavirus.

Klete Ikemoto's connection to the Southeast Japanese School and Community Center spanned nearly his entire life. He grew up playing SEYO basketball and baseball for Norwalk YAG while his father coached and his mother was parent rep. Through his participation, he met his best friend, Darryl Ishii (whose father Hiro Ishii helped build the Center's gym). The two would spend hours over the years creating memories while playing basketball. Even back then, Klete could be found working at the Cultural Festival when there was only grass and dirt or playing in YAG's annual basketball tournament every Thanksgiving.

It was because of his fond memories and lifelong friendships that when it came time for his oldest daughter, Katie, to start Japanese school, he and his wife, Teiko, chose to enroll her at the Southeast Japanese School. Little did he know that it would lead to Rascals basketball and the formation of the NYS Sapphires team in 2nd grade. Younger sisters Kristi and Kelsey soon followed enrolling in Japanese school and playing with the Blue Starz and Elite teams.

Always dedicated to giving back, Klete and Teiko joined the PTA and as a parent volunteer, Klete learned to set up Girls Day dolls and make Sakura mochi. However, Klete may be most significantly remembered for the hours he gave volunteering at the Center's annual Cultural Festival and Ondo. Although there were many changes over the years, including a paved parking lot and air conditioning in the kitchen, the meaning and purpose of the festival remained the same. And for Klete, carrying on the traditions and values for the younger generation was his priority.

In order to help ensure NYS would thrive for many years and that the Center and its cultural significance would last for future generations, Klete joined the NYS Club Executive Committee (CEC). Through his tireless dedication and ability to work with othestablished programs and policies Klete ers. to ensure consistency and equity among all NYS members. These visions and values can be seen today as they continue to guide the CEC and NYS. Klete also sat on the Center's Advisory Committee, acting as the liaison between the Center and NYS. In addition to volunteering countless hours at all the SEJS/NYS activities, he also was the Center's representative with other prominent Orange County JA community organizations to coordinate "Allegiance" ticket orders, and has represented NYS at SOC and Nikkei games dinners. Working on the CEC enabled Klete to continue those traditions from his childhood, reconnecting with old friends while making new ones. His contributions have made an indelible mark on NYS and the Center. Prior to his passing, he was nominated as an honoree at this year's Recognition Dinner for his time, commitment and efforts.

In addition to his commitments to NYS and the Center, Klete was also an active member of the Orange County Buddhist Church and volunteered with Yonsei Basketball Association through the participation of his daughters, Katie (Yonsei 24) and Kristi (Yonsei 26).

Above all, Klete was a beloved husband and father who enjoyed spending time with his family. The Ikemoto family had a special love for Disneyland; they have visited Disneyworld, Tokyo Disney and taken a Disney-themed cruise. It was a significant part of their memories and time together, and Klete loved every moment. Klete was the original "girl dad." His girls were everything to him. He had to become the expert with all princess trivia, movies, songs, becoming the 'prince' playing with the dolls, calico critters and everything cute; he enjoyed every minute of it.

Klete will be remembered for his humility, dedication to the community, and love for his family. Klete's family and friends will continue to honor him through their work and volunteerism at the SEJSCC. Teiko says that is what Klete would've wanted.

The Board of Directors would also like to reflect on what a special person Klete Ikemoto was to our Community Center. Klete was more than a member of the SEJSCC. He grew up at the Center, made life-long friends and wanted the same for his family. His 3 daughters kept him very busy and as a proud parent, he clearly became instrumental and a pillar of strength for our Center. You'd find him "in the trenches", always willing to lend a hand, no questions asked, and never hearing a complaint from him. And yet he was also a fierce and humble leader and with the help of others, reorganized NYS to what it is today His involvement with NYS, Japanese School and the CEC Board gained him much respect and showcased his leadership skills. In 2019, the Board unanimously voted in favor with President, Richard Shinomoto, asking Klete to join the BOD. We knew he would help lead our Center toward a future so our kids of today would grow up and have a place they too could call home. Klete graciously declined, prior commitments and family filled his days, but he told Richard that he was honored. In March, Klete was to be recognized at our 2020 Recognition Awards Dinner for his Outstanding Volunteer Services but the pandemic forced our event to be postponed until 2021. We will always remember Klete's quiet presence, his warm smile, and his unconditional kind heart.
